

Armenia in a Transforming World: ACNIS Releases New Yearbook

YEREVAN -- The Armenian Center for National and International Studies (ACNIS) publicly presented its annual trilingual almanac, this year entitled "Armenia in a Transforming World." The event brought together the yearbook's participating authors, editorial staff, publisher, foreign embassy personnel, political scientists, and media representatives for the expression of mutual gratitude and the sharing of views and evaluations.

Held in the official reception hall at ACNIS headquarters, the program was opened by Stiopa Safarian, the Center's director of research and academic editor of the new release. "The research presented in the yearbook encompasses Armenia's transnational and domestic challenges, which in the transforming world render imperative Armenia's own transformation. The answers provided by the authors to a variety of problematic issues such as international and regional security as well as Armenia's global surroundings and its complex relationships dictate new approaches for our Center and Armenia's analytical circles alike," he said.

Stiopa Safarian then conveyed ACNIS founder Raffi Hovannisian's greetings as expressed in the preface to the new yearbook. He also added that the objective of this almanac is to elicit and share with policymaker and public alike the principal trends of the contemporary world, Armenia's development priorities against their background, and policy responses to the challenges facing the Republic.

Before turning to the presentation of its contents, Safarian extended the Center's deep appreciation to the editorial staff and contributors for their diligent work, and acknowledged Vrezh Markosian, director of the Tigran Mets Publishing House, for his high-caliber production of the book. He also expressed gratitude to all the supporters of the Center throughout the world, who have made it possible to carry out such cutting-edge research programs in Armenia.

The comprehensive studies on the strategic directions of regional security, Armenia's economy, and other domains of utmost importance, in addition to the applied analyses and documentary materials published in this volume, he said, consist of three main parts—"Armenia, Region, World"; "Public and Expert Opinion Surveys"; and "Maps." These reflect the activity of the Center and its associated partners during the past year.

Part one of the 826-page compendium starts, in a chapter called "The Region and Its Conflicts," with an article by Dr. Martin Malek, a scholar from the Austrian National Academy of Defense, in which the author examines state collapse as a phenomenon of international relations. This monograph is followed by the works of ACNIS analysts Stiopa Safarian and Alvard Barkhudarian. The first of these is devoted to the origins of conflicts and symmetric and asymmetric solutions thereto, and the second to Mountainous Karabagh and its security parameters. Next, ACNIS analyst Hovhannes Vardanian presents the current democratization processes in the post-Soviet space,

and senior fellow Hovsep Khurshudian looks into the latest dynamics in Armenian-Russian economic relations. This chapter concludes with Yerevan State University professor Aram Harutiunian's incisive analysis of modern Russian-American correlations and ACNIS analyst Alen Ghevondian's examination of modern Iran. Also a valuable asset for the reader is Alvard Barkhudarian's exploration of interests and speculations with respect to the Baku-Tbilisi-Ceyhan pipeline.

The second chapter, on "Domestic Challenges," contains scholarly analyses and policy recommendations concerning the transformation of political thinking in Armenia; the peculiarities of the country's transitional period; constitutional and electoral code amendments in Armenia; the country's energy system; civil-military relations; and the attitude of Armenia's youth toward matters of national importance. These studies are prepared by Constitutional Court Justice Felix Tokhian, Karapet Kalenchian, Hovhannes Vardanian, Areg Barseghian, Alvard Barkhudarian, and Syuzanna Barseghian.

The book's second part features a presentation of ACNIS's public and expert opinion polls conducted over the course of 2004 and 2005. They are entitled "Corruption in Armenia"; "Armenia's Thirteen-Year-Old Independence and Sovereignty"; "Public Opinion and Urgent Issues on Armenia's Political Agenda"; "Constitutional and Electoral Reforms"; "The Karabagh Story: 17 Years in Progress"; "The Armenian Genocide: 90 Years and Waiting"; "The South Caucasus: Common or Separate Destinies? Armenia's Place and Role in the Region"; "Regional and Community Development Issues in Armenia"; and "Development Issues in Yerevan."

Finally, for the first time ever, this year's annual work product includes a section with twelve annotated maps depicting the past and present of the Mountainous Karabagh conflict. Yearbook 2005 concludes with a complete list of individual and institutional supporters of ACNIS from its founding to date.

Words of appreciation were delivered, and assessments offered, by participating authors Alvard Barkhudarian, Hovsep Khurshudian, and many others. It was yet again emphasized that the main characteristic of the yearbook is the variety of themes and genres and the free competition of ideas and policy options.

On behalf of the entire editorial staff the yearbook's editor-in-chief Gevorg Lalayan extended his heartfelt message. "First and foremost, this compilation is a product of teamwork." Lalayan concluded.

Armenian Genocide Monument Council of Glendale Hosts Exhibit

GLENDALE -- In Commemoration of the 91st Anniversary of the Armenian Genocide, the Armenian Genocide Monument Council of Glendale (AGMCG) will host an exhibit of all designs entered in last year's Genocide Monument Design Competition.

The exhibit will be held on Sunday, April 23rd, 2006 at the Alex Theater located at 216 North Brand Boulevard in Glendale. A private reception will be held at 11:00 am for contest participants, panel judges and the media. The exhibit will then open to the public at 12:30 pm immediately prior to the City of Glendale's Armenian Genocide Commemoration event which will begin at 1:30 pm.

The AGMCG hopes the exhibit will be an opportunity for all parties involved in the process to meet and become familiar with the selection process. Although the winner was announced last year, the groups have not had an opportunity thus far to review the designs and learn how the judges came to their final decision. Furthermore, the exhibit will introduce the winning design to the general public, as well as the contest participants who did not have an opportunity to see each design.

Last year, the AGMCG accepted 29

proposals from throughout the world including Canada, Lebanon, Japan and the United States. The entries were judged by a panel of artists, architects, professors, community leaders and city representatives. In April of 2005, the winner, along with the 1st and 2nd runners up, were announced at the City Council meeting. The grand prize was \$10,000.

The Armenian Genocide Monument Council of Glendale is an organization dedicated to enhancing cross cultural understanding amongst the different cultural and ethnic groups in the City of Glendale by promoting respect for past historical events and the recognition thereof through continuous education, specifically that of the Armenian Genocide.

Building a commemorative memorial in the City of Glendale dedicated to the victims of the Armenian Genocide, the first genocide of the 20th Century, will serve as a befitting venue to begin the educational process of honoring the memory of those who perished and acknowledging the memories of the heroic deeds and acts of the Americans whose actions helped save thousands of helpless Armenian men, women and children from the rage of the Genocide.

UCLA Conference on Sustainable Development in Armenia (May 6, 2006)

LOS ANGELES -- "Armenia: Challenges of Sustainable Development" is the theme of an international conference to be held at the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA), on Saturday, May 6, from 9:30 AM to 4:00 PM. in the Court of Sciences 50 (Young Hall). The conference featuring specialists in economics, finance, and governance is dedicated to UCLA Professor Emeritus of Economics, Armen A. Alchian, a world-renowned economist and teacher who was born in Fresno in 1914 and has been a member of the UCLA faculty since 1946.

The conference is organized by the Armenian Educational Foundation Chair in Modern Armenian History at UCLA and the Armenian International Policy Research Group (AIPRG), with support from the UCLA Von Grunebaum Center for Near Eastern Studies and the Department of Economics. AEF Chair Holder Richard Hovannisian will open the morning session with introductory comments on "The Economic Factor," followed by the presentation of Professor Alchian and his contributions to economic theory by a similarly distinguished Professor of Economics, Harold Demsetz.

Enrique Gelband, Deputy Division Chief and former Mission Chief to Armenia of the International Monetary Fund (IMF), will give the keynote address on "Growth and Poverty Reduction in Armenia: Achievements and Challenges," the title of his recent book published by the IMF. A panel discussion on the subject will be moderated by UCLA Professor of Economics Michael Intriligator and include William Ascher, McKenna Professor of Government and Economics at Claremont McKenna College; Daniel Mazmanian, Director of the Judith and John Bedrosian Center on Governance and the Public Enterprise at the University of Southern California; and Ara Khanjian, Professor of Economics at Ventura College.

The Saturday afternoon session moderated by Professor Lee Ohanian of the UCLA Department of Economics focuses on specific topics relating to Armenia's economic development. David Grigorian of the IMF will speak on "Tax Potential versus Tax Effort: Factors behind the Stubbornly Low Tax Collection in Armenia"; Bryan Roberts of the Department of Homeland Security, "Remittances, Poverty, and Growth in Armenia"; and Nerses Yeritsyan, Central Bank of Armenia, "Financial Sector Development in Armenia: Problems and Challenges." A discussion period will conclude the afternoon session.

Richard Hovannisian stated: "I am pleased that after sixteen wonderful semi-annual conferences on Historic Armenian Cities and Provinces, we shifted the focus to contemporary issues in 2005 with 'The Enduring Legacy of the Armenian Genocide' and 'Three Turkish Voices on the Armenian Question.' Now, for the first conference of 2006, the economic and fiscal challenges facing the Republic of Armenia will be addressed. I am thankful to David Grigorian for arranging much of the program, especially as Ascher, Khanjian, Roberts, Yeritsyan, and Grigorian are also associated with AIPRG. The subject of this conference is of critical importance to Armenia and all those concerned with the welfare of its people."

Armin T. Wegner: Intellectual, Doctor in Law, Photographer, Writer, Poet, Civil Rights Defender, and Eyewitness to the Armenian Genocide

Armin T. Wegner (October 16, 1886 – May 17, 1978) was a soldier in World War I, a writer and a co-creator of German Expressionism, a political activist for Armenian and Jewish human rights, and a victim of Nazi persecution.

He was born in the town of Elberfeld, Rhineland (Wuppertal) in Germany. He enrolled as a volunteer nurse in Poland at the outbreak of World War I during the winter of 1914-1915, and was awarded the Iron Cross for assisting wounded under fire. He served in the German Sanitary Corps of the Turkish Army during WWI, following the military alliance of Germany and Turkey. Being his personal caretaker, he traveled with Field Marshall von der Goltz along the Baghdad railroad in Mesopotamia, where he witnessed the Armenian Genocide.

Disobeying orders intended to smother news of the massacres, he gath-

for the creation of an independent Armenian state. For the rest of his life, the tragedy of Armenian people, to which he had been a witness in Ottoman Turkey, would haunt him.

In the 1920s Wegner reached the

ered information on the Genocide – collected documents, annotations, notes, and letters and took hundreds of photographs in the Armenian deportation camps – that later served as visible proof of the Arme-

peak of his popularity as a writer and a co-creator of German Expressionism. His book "Five Fingers Over You" made him a celebrity. It foresaw the advent of Stalinism.





Government in 1956. His native city of Wuppertal awarded him the prestigious Eduard-Von-der-Heydt prize in 1962.

A great part of his life was dedicated to the fight for Armenian and Jewish human rights. He was awarded the title of Righteous Among the Nations by Yad Vashem in Israel in 1967, the next year he received an invitation to Armenia from the

Catholicos of All Armenians. He was awarded the Order of Saint Gregory the Illuminator.

At the age of 92 he died in Rome. Part of his ashes were taken to Armenia in 1996. A posthumous state funeral took place near the Armenian Genocide Monument's perpetual flame.

nians' systematic annihilation. At the Turkish Command's request, Wegner was eventually arrested by the Germans and recalled to Germany. His photographs were confiscated and destroyed; however, he succeeded in taking out secretly some emulsions in his belt with images depicting the Armenian Genocide.

Wegner protested against the atrocities perpetrated by the Turkish army against the Armenian people in an open letter, which was submitted to Woodrow Wilson, the American President, at the peace conference of 1919. He appealed

Right from the beginning he was one of those to protest the Nazis' treatment of the Jews in Germany. He protested publicly against the persecution of the Jews, thus being the only writer in Nazi Germany ever to do so. In 1933 the Gestapo arrested him, a few days after he sent an open letter to Hitler protesting the state-organized boycott against Germany's Jews. He suffered incarceration in seven concentration camps and prisons before he could escape to Italy.

Wegner was awarded the Highest Order of Merit by the Federal German

percent of them voted for the constitutional changes proposed by Kocharyan.

However, the reported high turnout sharply contrasted with unusually empty polling stations witnessed by journalists and referendum observers across Armenia on polling day. The Armenian opposition said the real turnout stood at 16 percent, alleging a massive fraud.

Yeghiazarian endorsed the opposition allegations, describing just how the referendum was rigged. "We had been handed the lists of voters that also contained their passport numbers and dates of birth. "For three consecutive nights, forged signatures were put [to those lists] by the election commissions across the region."

"In reality, only 60 people [in Oshakan] took part in the referendum. And yet we 'painted' 1,649 'yes' votes," added the election official.

Yeghiazarian, whose days as commission chairman now look numbered, claimed that he hesitated to come forward with his purported revelations earlier on because of being "periodically" intimi-

dated by provincial authorities. He said he has already written to Kocharyan's staff, Prosecutor-General Aghvan Hovsepian and even Defense Minister Serzh Sarkisian admitting to what is a serious crime under Armenian law only to be told by them to "go away."

Yeghiazarian is the first head of an Armenian election body to publicly admit having perpetrated serious fraud. The Armenian opposition was quick to pick up his statements, with Geghamian's National Unity Party (AMK) helping the official hold the news conference in the parliament building in Yerevan. Both the AMK and Demirchyan's Artarutyun alliance demanded an official investigation.

Spartak Yeghiazarian was questioned by police for several hours on Tuesday. He told RFE/RL that the "prophylactic conversation" was personally led by the chief of Armenia's Police Service, Colonel-General Hayk Harutiunian. He said he was also summoned to the Aragatsotn prosecutor's office for questioning at the weekend. He said the Armenian police chief was wondering whether he implicated law-enforcement officials in vote rigging during his news conference.

ATP Greens More Than 75 Community Sites in Armenia This Spring



YEREVAN -- Since the early 1990s, Armenia Tree Project (ATP) has been successfully collaborating with local communities and institutions to plant hundreds of thousands of trees through its Community Tree Planting (CTP) program.

The CTP program begins by surveying the appropriateness of the site and the community to receive trees. The program uses criteria such as the availability of irrigation water, soil quality, caretakers, and residents' enthusiasm for planting and growing trees. With this flagship program, ATP has collaborated with people at over 500 sites in Yerevan and every region throughout Armenia, including Artsakh.

On a daily basis, three ATP monitors—Navasard Dadyan, Arthur Harutunyan, and Seyran Hovhannisyan—evaluate potential planting sites and visit sites that were planted in previous years to check growth rates and provide technical assistance. By the end of March, ATP selected 77 community sites that were eligible to receive seedlings, and had begun the process of helping residents plant nearly 25,000 new trees at schools, senior centers, orphanages, hospitals, kindergartens, and other non-profit institutions.

To ensure a high survival rate at CTP sites, ATP publishes training material on tree planting and tree care. Prior to planting, ATP distributes this information to local residents and trains them on topics such as the proper depth for planting new seedlings, how often to irrigate seedlings, and how to monitor the growth of the trees. ATP also distributes hoses, shovels, and other supplies and equipment as needed.

Sites in eight regions of Armenia—Armavir, Aragatsotn, Vayots Dzor, Shirak, Ararat, Kotayk, Syunik, and Lori—received fruit and decorative trees from ATP for village orchards, backyards, gardens, and common spaces.

"In a few years, the people in these villages will be able to reap fruitful harvests and be in a position to receive great benefits from these trees," emphasized CTP Program Manager Anahit Gharibyan. Last year alone, ATP's trees in various communities had a harvest of over 250,000 pounds of apricots, apples, peaches, plums, and cherries.

ATP's nurseries in the refugee villages of Karin and Khachpar produce all of the seedlings that are planted by the CTP program each year. Some of the neighborhoods in Yerevan that received trees include Malatia Sebastia, Davitashen, Achapniak, and Zeytun Kanaker, and ATP planted trees at the State Medical University, European Regional Academy, and Genocide Memorial Park. The CTP program is planning to plant an additional 125,000 seedlings from one of ATP's other nurseries this spring.

ATP was founded in 1994 with the vision of securing Armenia's future by protecting its environment and restoring its degraded forests. ATP advances Armenia's socio-economic development by mobilizing resources for large-scale reforestation, community-based tree planting, environmental education and advocacy, and rural development through job creation. ATP uses trees to improve the standard of living of Armenians, promoting self-sufficiency and aiding those with fewest resources first.

Over the past 12 years, ATP has planted and rejuvenated over 750,000 trees. With the establishment of the new Mirak Family reforestation nursery in Margahovit and expansion of the backyard nursery program in the Getik River Valley, ATP's Rural and Mountainous Development (RMD) program is working toward the goal of planting over one million trees in 2006. timony," Judge Vaskuti said upon announcing the verdict. "During the whole case we waited for him to be at least a bit sorry for the Armenian soldier he killed brutally and for (Markarian's) family."

Safarov's lawyer, Gyorgy Magyar, said they would immediately appeal the verdict, adding that it was yet unclear whether his client would serve his sentence in Hungary or be extradited to Azerbaijan.

A lawyer representing Markarian's family said she was satisfied with the court's decision. "We're happy that the court honestly evaluated all the materials of this case and the brutal intentions ... of the murderer," said Nazeli Vartanian. "This

is a good decision for the Hungarian court and for (Armenian) society."

Making his final statement to the court earlier Thursday, Safarov said the conflict between Azerbaijan and Armenia was at the root of his act, and that the Armenian officer had repeatedly provoked and ridiculed him. He said he was unable to suppress his feelings and his wartime memories due to Markarian's behavior.

"My conscience was clouded as a result of the insults and humiliating and provoking behavior, and I lost all control," Safarov told the court. "It would not be correct to consider it as merely a pre-meditated act caused by the awakening of revenge and hate upon seeing the Armenians." Safarov denied trying to kill a second Armenian officer.
