Nationwide Lockdown Imposed in Armenia



YEREVAN -- The Armenian government stepped up on Tuesday its efforts to contain the spread of coronavirus, saying that people in Armenia will only be allowed to leave their homes to buy food, receive medical care or exercise.

Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan announced the nationwide lockdown in the evening as the number of officially registered coronavirus cases in the country rose by 14 to 249. He said one of the persons infected with the COVID-19 virus, a 77-year-old man, is in "extremely grave" and four others in "grave" condition.

In Pashinyan's words, 868 Armenians remained in quarantine and more than 2,400 others in self-isolation. He said 37 other people were released from a two-week quarantine on Tuesday after testing negative for coronavirus.

The premier also announced that four more patients recovered from the virus and were discharged from hospital on Tuesday. Two others were reportedly cured of the disease last week.

"This [lockdown] means that the work of thousands of enterprises will be halted and only vitally necessary entities will be allowed to operate," Pashinyan said in a televised address to the nation. "Our fellow citizens taking to the streets will have to clearly ex-

plain where they are going and those explanations must fit into the logic of people's vital movements."

"I want to apologize to all of you for these restrictions and inconvenience," he said. "But I hope it is obvious to all of you that this is done for your safety and the safety of our parents and grandparents: pillars of our national self-consciousness."

Earlier in the day, a government task force enforcing a coronavirus-related state of emergency in Armenia announced a de facto partial closure of virtually all state agencies. It said only a limited number of their employees will be allowed to go to work.

Acting on Pashinyan's earlier decision announced overnight, the government also ordered the temporary closure of all cafes and restaurants as well as most businesses in the country.

In his latest address, Pashinyan urged Armenians to use, if possible, online services provided by state and private entities. He also stressed that food stores, pharmacies and bank offices will remain open and that no restrictions will be placed on agricultural work.

"We are overcoming coronavirus step by step ... Rest assured that we will defeat this evil," concluded Pashinyan.

Shushi Massacre of 1920 Laid the Foundation for the Azerbaijan-Karabakh Conflict



STEPANAKERT -- One hundred years ago, on March 23, 1920, the authorities of the newly created Azerbaijani Democratic Republic massacred the Armenian population of Shushi, the then administrative and cultural center of Artsakh, the Foreign Ministry of the Artsakh Republic said in a statement.

As a result of this heinous crime,

thousands of Armenians were killed, tens of thousands were forced to flee their homes and the Armenian part of the city was looted, burned and completely destroyed. The surviving Armenian residents of Shushi, who made up the majority of the city's population, were completely expelled. Most of the once

US Halts Aid to Artsakh Amidst Heavy Demining Activity in Region



WASHINGTON, DC – The Trump Administration announced today, to cut all aid to The Nagorno-Karabakh Republic (Artsakh), reported the Armenian Council of America (ACA).

The decision by the Trump Administration to cut aid to Artsakh weighs heavily on the misconception that all demining efforts have been completed in Artsakh, a presumption unsupported by HALO officials and the Congressional Caucus on Armenian Issues, including Congressmembers

Judy Chu and Jackie Speier, both of which visited Artsakh recently and advocated for an increase in funding for much needed demining in the region. USAID officials are citing that the funding allocated for Artsakh should be utilized for issues that are of a "higher priority."

The Foreign Ministry of The Nagorno-Karabakh Republic issued the following statement:

Minsk Group Co-Chairs Call on Parties to Observe the Ceasefire Strictly



VIENNA (Armradi) -- Noting the current suspension of monitoring exercises by the Personal Representative of the OSCE Chairperson-in-Office due to the exceptional situation created by the spread of COVID-19, the OSCE Minsk Group Co-Chairs (Igor Popov of the Russian Federation, Stéphane Visconti of France, and Andrew Schofer of the United States of America) appealed to the sides to reaffirm their commitment to observe the ceasefire strictly and refrain from any provocative action that could further raise tensions during this period.

"Recognizing that the region's medical resources should be dedicated exclusively to combating the spread of the virus and treating those affected, we urge the sides to exercise the greatest possible restraint to lessen the risk of escalation including by making maximum use of the existing direct communication links," the Co-Chairs said in a statement.

Despite the heavy restrictions on international travel, the Co-Chairs will continue their mediation efforts without interruption, remaining in close contact with each other and with the sides.

Ambassador Andrzej Kasprzyk, Personal Representative of the OSCE Chairperson-in-Office, announced earlier today that the mission was suspending the monitoring exercises.

"The ongoing situation following the spread of COVID-19 has led to the closure of international borders throughout the region, travel restrictions for international and local staff, as well as restrictions put in place to avoid face-to-face contact to reduce the risk of infection. In view of the above, and following consultations with the sides, monitoring exercises will be suspended until these restrictions are lifted. In the meantime, I continue to be in contact with the relevant military authorities."

Arrest Warrant Issued for Former Minister and Yerevan Mayor Gagik Beglaryan

YEREVAN -- Armenia's National Security Service (NSS) moved on Tuesday to arrest Gagik Beglaryan, a controversial former government minister and Yerevan mayor, after bringing corruption charges against him.

In a statement, the NSS claimed that Beglaryan illegally privatized a kindergarten building in central Yerevan when he ran the Armenian capital from 2009-2011. Beglaryan paid only 24 million drams (\$51,000) to buy the kindergarten, the statement said, adding that the market value of the 200-square-meter property was almost ten times higher.

The statement also said that although a Yerevan court has allowed investigators to arrest Beglaryan, the latter is not in Armenia at the moment. The NSS will try to track him down and seek his extradition, it said.

The security service did not shed more light on the once influential ex-minister's whereabouts.

A former senior member of former President Serzh Sarkisian's Republican Party of Armenia (HHK), the 56-year-old Beglaryan is no stranger to controversy. He was forced to resign as Yerevan mayor in December 2010 after reportedly assaulting an official from the presidential administration's protocol unit. The official, Aram Kandayan, incurred



Beglaryan's ire after asking the latter's wife not to sit next to Sarkisian during an opera concert in Yerevan.

Beglaryan and his bodyguards reportedly kidnapped and beat up Kandayan afterwards. Beglaryan was never prosecuted for what a presidential spokesman condemned as an "unacceptable and intolerable" behavior.

He was on the contrary appointed as transport minister in June 2012. He held that post for four years.

Beglaryan, who is better known as "Black Gago," used to hold sway in a central Yerevan neighborhood notorious for election-related violence against opposition activists. Opposition groups for years accused him of leading a local clan that rigged elections and bullied the government's political opponents.

Jeffrey Ghazarian, 34, Dies from Coronavirus; Recently Visited Disney World in Florida

LOS ANGELES - Jeffrey Ghazarian, 34, a Glendora resident has died just days ago after testing positive for COVID-19. He has recently visited Walt Disney World and Universal Studios in Florida, according to TMZ.

In a Facebook post, Ghazarian's family members said he died Thursday morning at a Pasadena hospital after being hospitalized for several days,

According to TMZ, his sister stated, "He suffered a lot and put up a good fight. We will miss our Jeff every day but we are thankful for all the fun happy memories of the times we had together."

According to his family, Ghazarian flew from Los Angeles to Orlando on March 2 for a work conference. During his time in Orlando, he went to Disney World and Universal theme parks with friends.

TMZ reported that Ghazarian began to develop a cough on March 7 and the next day he coughed up blood.

He returned to Los Angeles International Airport on March 9 and immediately went to the emergency room, where he also had a high fever.

TMZ reports that medical personnel performed a chest x-ray and confirmed that Ghazarian had pneumonia. He was reportedly tested for COVID-19 before he was sent home



with antibiotics and fluids and was instructed to self-quarantine while he awaited the results.

He found out he tested positive for coronavirus on March 13, TMZ reported. The next day he was taken to the hospital by ambulance and quickly transferred to the ICU. At which point, doctors discovered that his lungs were 60-70 percent blocked with pneumonia.

Doctors chose to sedate and intubate him in hopes that using a ventilator would help his lungs heal.

Ghazarian passed away Thursday morning. His family stated he had a history of asthma and frequent bronchitis as a child. He also had beat testicular cancer back in 2016, which made him a higher risk for contracting coronavirus.

Soprano Isabel Bayrakdarian's "The Other Cleopatra: Queen of Armenia"

Operatic soprano and proud recipient of the Republic of Armenia's Komitas and Movses Khorenatsi medals, Isabel Bayrakdarian's album, "The Other Cleopatra: Queen of Armenia" released today, features three operas bearing the title "Il Tigrane," by baroque composers Hasse, Vivaldi and Gluck, all of which are based on the same libretto or storyline by Abate Francesco Silvani. The album features fellow Grammy Award nominee Constantine Orbelian, principal conductor of Lithuania's Kaunas Symphony Orchestra.

It was by coincidence that Bayrakdarian came across baroque composer Hasse's opera manuscript "Il Tigrane" which celebrates the life, loves, virtues and triumphs of the Armenian King Tigranes II, also known as Tigranes the Great of Armenia or Medzn Tigran in Armenian. This discovery led her to lay the groundwork for her new album, conducting research at the University of California, Santa Barbara (UCSB) where she is an Associate Professor of Voice and Opera. "Like all serendipitous connections, this project found me, instead of the other way around," said Bayrakdarian.

Fascinated by the manuscript and her strong connection to her own Armenian identity, Bayrakdarian embarked on an extensive scholarly work at UCSB, immersing herself in researching other baroque composers who had written operas about Tigranes II. "I discovered there are at least twenty-four operas written about him, but most manuscripts were lost," said Bayrakdarian.

She reveals that while there are many wonderful arias and ensembles in the newly discovered operas, to give her project more focus and more importantly, to make it fit her own voice



and temperament, she concentrated on one of the main roles in the opera: Cleopatra of Pontus, daughter of Mithridates VI and later Queen Consort of King Tigranes II.

Bayrakdarian reminisces learning about King Tigran in Armenian history classes in her youth, but emphasizes that not much is taught about his wife Cleopatra (not to be confused with Cleopatra of Egypt). "Our history books omitted Cleopatra's name and existence completely," said Bayrakdarian. "She was in fact instrumental in making Tigranes II the greatest king in Armenian history, through the marriage alliance of the two mighty nations: Armenia and Pontus. I immediately felt a personal connection to this new Cleopatra, and was driven by a keen desire to bring awareness to her existence and to give her a voice, literally, after 2000 years of silence and obscurity. This impetus, as well as the fact that the newly

discovered arias were gorgeous and were significant additions to the baroque opera canon, made it very easy for me to actualize my project 'The Other Cleopatra: Queen of Armenia,' added Bayrakdarian.

What distinguishes this unique album from others she has released, is Bayrakdarian's collection of unknown, unreleased operatic arias, which are world premiere recordings, all coming from different operas united by the same libretto or storyline. "This offers the listener a rare chance to view Cleopatra from the perspective of three prolific composers — Hasse, Vivaldi and Gluck—using the same text to animate very different artistic expressions. Vocally, the composers' choice of vocal range for the role of Cleopatra sits differently, making for a very diverse vocal showcase," she added.

Bayrakdarian feels blessed and is as passionate about her vocal career as she is about being an associate profes-

sor. "Teaching and performing are more similar than one might think. They are both about giving. I've always been passionate about performing—there's no way to describe the incredible feeling of being on stage, connecting with my audience, and being a conduit for the divine through my voice. I'm equally passionate about guiding young singers as they grow into their full potentials, and to help equip them with a solid technique so they can also be free to speak and sing their truths," revealed Bayrakdarian.

For young, aspiring artists Bayrakdarian believes: "There is one single piece of advice that keeps getting reinforced in my life again and again—find out what you love to do, and do it fearlessly! If you're led by your inner voice/intuition and are passionate about sharing it and adding value to the collective, then you will always find your niche/calling, be a trailblazer, and become someone who stands out because they create something new."

Among her many accolades, Bayrakdarian has been featured as a vocalist on the Grammy-Award winning soundtrack of the film "The Two Towers" from The Lord of the Rings trilogy and on the soundtrack of Atom Egoyan's "Ararat." She sings on the BBC-produced short film "HOLOCAUSTA Music Memorial Film from Auschwitz," as well as her Gemini-nominated film "Long Journey Home," documenting her first visit to her ancestral homeland, Armenia. Bayrakdarian is the winner of four consecutive Juno Awards for Best Classical Album among several other awards and honors.

President Armen Sarkissian Initiates Series of Lectures Amid CoronaVirus Emergency



YEREVAN (Armradio) -- President Armen Sarkissian has initiated a series of online lectures aimed at providing students with continuous education through the use of distance learning methods amid the state of emergency.

Today, the President delivered an online lecture for a group of students of the Faculties of Mathematics

and Mechanics, Physics, Informatics and Applied Mathematics, as well as Oriental Studies of the Yerevan State University.

Among other topics, the President referred to the spread of the coronavirus in the world.

"We all live in special times when coronavirus is spreading in Armenia and around the world. Each of us

strives to live, not by self-isolation, but by maintaining a certain distance from others. I think keeping social distance and focusing on own work is really a good thing, especially if you are young, if you have a lot to think about, to learn," president Sarkissian said.

The President said that during the past two millennia there have been numerous epidemics that have been of both bacterial and viral nature. Before the antibiotics would be discovered social distancing or self-isolation was the only way to fight epidemics, he said.

Speaking about the coronavirus, the President said we are going to overcome it together.

"Remember that each of you must have a clear goal and plan for this or the coming few months and be disciplined at the same time," the President said.

"Being well-organized and disciplined is essential. Take responsibility not only for our country, our nation, this great health problem, but also for yourself. One of your most precious values is your time, and if you are

home for a month and connected to the world virtually, then you should make the most of it," President Sarkissian stated.

"Today, the world is very different. I've been thinking about that world for many years, even trying to apply mathematics to the world I call quantum. In the quantum sense, the processes that take place in today's world are not classical because the speeds are different, and we often move at a very high speed. Second, we communicate at the speed of light. Third, it is quantum in the sense that the old approaches, whether in politics, economics, relations, are practically unworkable, new forms are being created. Therefore, global risks also acquire a certain quantum character, that is, they are not classically predictable," the President noted.

"It is unpredictable that, for example, if the virus starts in China, where is the next country, – Italy or, let's say, France. In one of my speeches months ago, when I was speaking

beautiful Armenian city was in ruins for many years. The enormous cultural heritage of Shushi was destroyed.

"The scale and cruelty of this crime struck the contemporaries who visited Shushi immediately after the massacre and noted that the wells were filled with the bodies of women and children. The tragedy left such a deep mark on the city and its atmosphere that even after 10 years it caused gloomy impressions and heavy feelings, which one of the prominent Russian writers of the twentieth century, Osip Mandelstam, reflected in his poem 'Phaeton Driver,'" the Ministry said.

"The Shushi massacre became the apotheosis of the two-year-long attempts of the Azerbaijani authorities to seize and subjugate Artsakh. These irrepressible and unreasonable territorial claims on Artsakh by Azerbaijan, which was created as a result of the Turkish invasion in the South Caucasus, laid the foundation for the Azerbaijan-Karabakh conflict in its modern sense. The Azerbaijani authorities tried to achieve their goal through the direct support by the Turkish troops. Subsequently, the Turkish officers and emissaries continued to assist the Azerbaijani armed forces, including in organizing the Shushi massacre of 1920, attempting to continue the Genocide of Armenians, now in Eastern Armenia," the statement read.

The forcible inclusion of Artsakh in the structure of Soviet Azerbaijan, following the Sovietization of the Re-

publics of the South Caucasus, did not solve the issue, as the policy of the Azerbaijani authorities towards the Armenian population of Artsakh changed only in form, but not in content, the Ministry added.

"The beginning of the process of collapse of the Soviet Union in the late 1980s and early 1990s once again actualized the issue of physical security of the Armenian population of Artsakh. In response to the peaceful demands of the people of Artsakh for reunification with Armenia, a wave of mass killings and pogroms of Armenians swept throughout Azerbaijan. Thousands of Armenians were killed and maimed, hundreds of thousands were deported. The Armenian pogroms of the 1988-1990s were the continuation of the Shushi massacre of 1920 and clearly demonstrated that even after 70 years neither the goals nor the methods of the Azerbaijani authorities had changed," the Foreign Ministry said.

"Only thanks to the self-organization of the people of Artsakh, which created a capable state with all the necessary institutions, including an efficient army, as well as the support of the Armenians worldwide, it was possible to repel the armed aggression of Azerbaijan in 1991-1994 and to prevent the repeating of the Shushi scenario in Artsakh, but on a larger scale," the statement continued.

Today, the authorities and people of Artsakh are exerting every effort to revive Shushi and to restore the cultural heritage of the city destroyed by the Azerbaijani authorities.

about the quantum world, I gave an example that, if there is a disease, let's say, in China, the next countries might be, say, Argentina and Italy. This, of course, was not a prediction, but a quantum process as well. Of course, you can make this conspiracy theory that I knew it would be in China, Italy would come, but that's just a quantum

behavior," he added.

At the end of the lecture, the President suggested that each of the listeners think and somehow solve a mathematical modeling problem related to coronavirus. "You can write about any problem related to global risk, its modeling. You can write 1 or 10 pages. Consider the deadline as the end of a state of emergency," the President said.
